Who we are and what we do

The Irish Haemophilia Society (IHS) represents the interests of people with haemophilia and other bleeding disorders, providing the following services:

- Education
- · Conferences and events
- Advocacy
- Publications
- Educational Grants
- Accommodation to members attending hospital (St. James' or CHI Crumlin)
- Outreach

Additionally, we collaborate with the medical teams within the haemophilia and bleeding disorders services, namely the National Coagulation Centre (NCC), CHI Crumlin, Cork University Hospital (CUH), and with other healthcare and people within the field of haematology.

Outreach is an important function provided by the IHS. Our Outreach Coordinator is happy to arrange home or hospital visits, be it just for tea and a chat, or advice on how best to address a particular issue that may arise for a member.

Board and Staff

The Executive Board for 2023 comprised of 10 members; Seamus McDonald, Barbara Wynne, Dan McIntyre, Jim O'Leary, Mary Clare Delaney, Aislinn Farrelly, Breda Quealy, Paul Dunne, Donal McCann (stood down from the board on November 2nd 2023) and I.

There were six staff members in the Society in 2023: Brian, Debbie, Nina, Rob, Suzanne and Róisín, who do a tremendous job in keeping the organisation functioning. However, Suzanne resigned in September, brining it down to five staff.

Without the work of the Board and staff, we could not have the type of Society that we do. I cannot commend or thank them highly enough for the work that they do.

Conferences and Events

The year 2023 was a characteristically busy year for conferences and events for the Society. The 2023 AGM took place in the Slieve Russell Hotel, with 212 people in attendance. This number was considerably higher than 2022, when 156 people attended.

In 2023, the Society held a Parents' Conference, the first in several years. This took place in July at the Midlands Park Hotel, Portlaoise. There were 130 people in attendance, which was a great turnout, considering that it took place in the middle of the holiday period.

The October Conference, which took place at the Mount Wolseley Hotel, Carlow, had 210 attendees. The high turnout at our main events demonstrates the strong sense of community that exists within the Society.

We also marked World Haemophilia Day on the 22nd April 2023, held a Von Willebrand Disorder Information Day, which was very well attended on the 23rd September 2023, and a Women and Bleeding Disorders Conference on the 2nd and 3rd December 2023. These smaller, specific events are very important.

The quality of our events is a credit to the Society staff. It takes an awful lot of work to organise an event, regardless of the size. Traditionally, this involves identifying interest in a particular topic or area, establishing if there is interest from the members, booking a suitable venue, developing a programme, organising volunteers, managing bookings, and so on. These events are a key element of our Society as they facilitate the sharing of information and allow our members to meet, catch up and stay in touch. They ensure that new members, who may have a new diagnosis of a bleeding disorder, feel welcomed and supported.

In addition to our traditional conferences and events, four regional visits took place in 2023 (Cork, Athlone, Donegal and Galway). A busy physiotherapy/exercise and pilates exercise programme was delivered online.

Finally, our outreach programme was intensive in 2023, including 832 phone calls to members, return calls to non-members and the provision of support to our Ukrainian and Syrian friends.

Grants and Awards

Each year, the Society provides grants for third level education. Qualifying courses range from PLC-level courses, up to degree and post-graduate study.

There are three categories of grants available:

- The Maureen and Jack Downey Educational Grant
- The Margaret King Educational Grant
- The Fr. Paddy McGrath Educational Grant

In 2022, 16 applications were received and €15,200 was distributed amongst those who applied. I should point out that the standard of application is very high. For more information on educational grants, see https://haemophilia.ie/services-and-support/educational-grants/.

Fundraising

Fundraising is an important source of income for the Society. I cannot emphasise enough how grateful we are to the efforts people make to fundraise for us.

Every event is important and shows a connection to the Society. No event is too big or too small and I thank each and every one of you who have supported the Society through fundraising and donations. In 2023, members raised €2,208 through events and activities they organised.

Planned Giving is another important fundraiser for the Society. The funds raised through Planned Giving are allocated primarily to costs associated with the apartments owned by the Society and operated for members. The apartments are a hugely valuable asset to which members have access when they are attending Dublin for a hospital appointment in St. James's Hospital or CHI Crumlin. It is a huge relief knowing that you don't need to arrange accommodation when coming to Dublin for an overnight. Once again, this was a particularly valuable asset during the pandemic as it gave assurance that people could attend their hospital appointments knowing that they could stay as safe as possible. Planned Giving raised €15,514 in 2023 and members also donated an additional €11,953. Thank you all so much.

The apartment has proven to be such an important service for our members that we purchased another apartment in the same complex in 2021. This is a vital exercise in forward planning as it will prove to be hugely beneficial to our members when the Children's Hospital moves to its new location on the St. James's site. The apartments were used over 100 times during 2023.

AGM & Annual Conference

The AGM & Annual Conference took place over the weekend of the 3rd to 5th March in the Slieve Russell Hotel in Cavan. The programme consisted of talks and lectures on topics such as: novel therapies, gene therapy, physiotherapy and an open forum. The conference was very well attended.

World Haemophilia Day

To mark World Haemophilia Day, the Society organised an information day for people with mild haemophilia which took place in the Grand Hotel in Malahide on 22nd April.

Parents Conference

The Parents Conference took place in collaboration with the team at CHI Crumlin over the weekend of 14th to 16th July in the Midlands Park Hotel in Portlaoise. The programme consisted of topics such as: treatment, the new Children's Hospital, inheritance, carrier issues, nosebleeds, pathways to care, sports and an open forum. This was the first Parents Conference since 2016 and it was great to see new families attending this event, who are now members.

Von Willebrand Information Day

An information day for people with Von Willebrand Disorder took place on Saturday 23rd September in the Grand Hotel in Malahide. The programme consisted of an interactive workshop, updates about treatment and treatment expectations over the next five years.

October Conference

The October Conference took place over the weekend of 20th to 22nd October in Mount Wolseley Hotel in Carlow. The programme consisted of workshops on different treatment options, a debate, a women's health survey, a talk on travelling wisely and a family guiz. This conference went very well, and we were delighted to have three Syrian families in attendance at this event.

Women & Bleeding Disorders Conference

A conference for women with bleeding disorders took place on 2nd and 3rd December in Grand Hotel in Malahide. The programme consisted of topics including menstruation, pregnancy and conception, menopause, physical

Regional Visits

Four regional visits took place last year to Cork, Athlone, Donegal and Galway. Whilst numbers were low it was agreed that all of these visits were very worthwhile with excellent discussions taking place during the meetings.

PHYSIO/EXERCISE & PILATES EXERCISE CLASSES

The physio/exercise and pilates classes continued last year with 34 physio classes taking place and 32 pilates classes taking place.

OUTREACH

Over the course of 2023, in excess of 862 phone calls were made to members to offer support and assistance. Phone calls were also made to non-members who contacted the office looking for support. During 2023 the Society continued to give support to Ukrainian refugees with bleeding disorders and also gave support to Syrian refugees with bleeding disorders.

PUBLICATIONS, SOCIAL MEDIA & WEBSITE

During 2023, the Society produced 4 quarterly magazines, one novel therapies publication and an annual report. Social media platforms continue to work well for the organisation. The Society continues to have a strong presence online with 1,851 followers on Facebook, 1,422 on Twitter and 251 on Instagram. The Society continued distributing the electronic magazine e-zine, which has proved to be very popular, so much so that we have 467 people signed up for this. In 2023 a total of 23 e-zines were produced. A lot of work has also been and will continue to be done on content for our website.

The Year in Review from our CEO

We are fortunate to be living in a time of great advances in therapy for haemophilia and other bleeding disorders. For the past several years and continuing in 2023, Ireland has been actively participating in clinical trials for new therapies. Ongoing clinical trials here include participation in the phase three trials for the FIX gene therapy Hemgenix (now licenced by the EMA), the RNA I inhibitor Fitusiran which is a rebalancing agent, the mimetic MiM8 which may be a future competitor for Emicizumab and the super extended half-life FVIII Bivv-001 (now licenced in the USA as Altuviiio). Together with the existing half life FVIII and FIX products, the subcutaneous mimetic currently used in Ireland and other novel therapies in clinical trials, this adds up to a complex and exciting therapeutic landscape now and in the future.


Information about current and forthcoming therapies and all aspects of treatment or care are provided not just via our publications, but also through our events. We are fortunate that there is a strong culture of members attending our events. It is very difficult to produce a single publication on therapies that would provide information at the required level for such a diverse population: hence the importance of covering these topics at our events. We do publish two issues each year of the Novel Therapies Report, which goes into great detail on developments with all the current and future therapies. This excellent publication is based on content produced by the European Haemophilia Consortium. We recognise however that this level of detail is not required and is not particularly useful for many people with haemophilia or other family members. The publication is designed for people with a keen interest in therapies and it also performs a second vital function of being an educational tool for healthcare workers.

During the course of 2023 we covered the evolving therapeutic environment in great detail at several of our events. This included a lecture by the World Federation of Haemophilia Vice President Medical, Dr. Glenn Pierce, at our Annual Conference on therapeutic choice in the era of gene therapy, in addition to a lecture on educational approaches with novel therapies. To support this approach, we had a panel discussion at our October Conference where people with bleeding disorders spoke about their experiences with different therapies which are licenced or in clinical trials, followed by a broad discussion on selecting therapeutic options. We are strongly encouraging the approach of shared decision making in relation to choosing therapeutic options. Indeed, we used the newly developed WFH shared decision making tool at the October Conference during the workshop.

At the Parents Conference there was an update on the national experience with the use of Emicizumab and during our information days on mild haemophilia and von Willebrand disorder respectively there were updates on current and future therapeutic options.

Novel Therapies on the Horizon





Our events were highly successful during 2023. We organised three major conferences which, as usual, had adult programmes and separate programmes and activities for youth, older children, younger children and a creche. The programmes for youth and children are possible because of the dedication and involvement of our excellent pool of volunteers. The three major conferences were our Annual Conference in March, our Parents Conference in July and our October Members' Conference. The Annual Conference included sessions on comprehensive care, an update on the iPATH research programme and an update on haemophilia worldwide. Our October Members' Conference, which is usually more informal, in addition to the previously mentioned panel discussions on treatment, had a debate on the impact of haemophilia versus von Willebrand Disorder, and lectures on the patient portal and on travelling wisely. It also included a talk on the new Women's Health Survey which is being led by Dr. Megan Kennedy and Dr. Michelle Lavin. We took the opportunity at the conference to pilot test the survey. We had an excellent talk by member Colm Walsh who swam from Cork to the Fastnet lighthouse - an incredible swim which very few people could or have achieved.

For the first time for several years we held a Parents Conference which was very successful and included an update on the new Children's Hospital, a session on inheritance and carriers and talks on sports, an update on Society services and an open forum. Our strategic plan now calls for a parents conference every third year as we believe this is the optimum interval between these conferences to share new content with parents that would not be covered by the other conferences. Our plan also calls for a women and bleeding disorders conference one year followed by an ageing conference the following year. In 2023, we organised a very successful Women and Bleeding Disorders Conference, which included sessions on heavy menstrual bleeding, conception and pregnancy, menopause, paediatric care for girls with bleeding disorders, physical activity, and diet and nutrition. We also organised our annual information days on VWD and on mild haemophilia respectively. The VWD Information Day included an update on treatment and care and an interactive workshop where people with VWD discussed what they would like to see in the next five years. It also provided us with an opportunity to get further input on the Women's Health Survey. The Mild Haemophilia Information Day included an update on the use of Emicizumab in mild haemophilia, dental care and a very lively discussion.

We are pleased that such a high proportion of our membership attend events. Our last three major events have booked out even before the closing date. We do not presume that they were successful- this is based on extensive evaluations carried out by event attendees which are compiled and are also used to plan future events and content. As we look to the future and the availability of more complex therapies and gene therapy, the willingness of our members to attend meetings and events should mean that it will be easier for us to provide information at a level which people need and understand, in an environment where questions can be asked and where we can assist members to make fully informed decisions on therapy on all occasions.

In terms of comprehensive care, we were pleased that in late 2023, following sustained advocacy from the Society and from the National Coagulation Centre and National Haemophilia Council, access for people with haemophilia and inherited bleeding disorders to the H&H ward in St. James's Hospital was restored. A new senior nurse was appointed at the Galway University Hospital centre. The Society and the National Haemophilia Council continued to advocate for more dedicated physiotherapy time for the Children's Hospital in Crumlin - an issue which has frustratingly been on the agenda for quite a long time. We had concerns during the year about the potential relocation of the outpatient haemophilia centre in Cork away from the main campus and we made it very clear to the Chief Executive and his team that this would not be acceptable to the community. The peer reviewed external audits of the comprehensive care centres which will take place in 2024 and for which planning commenced in 2023 should assist in highlighting current gaps in the comprehensive care service and hopefully help to remedy these gaps.

The Society continued our formal participation on the Haemophilia Product Selection and Monitoring Advisory Board (HPSMAB). During the year, contracts were renewed for extended half-life FVIII and FIX, as well as bypassing agents. A new contract was issued for cold chain delivery of products which provides for the delivery to the homes of people with bleeding disorders of FVIII, FIX or Emicizumab for their home therapy. The Society representation on the HPSMAB changed this year. I remain on the HPSMAB as Vice Chair and Society representative but I have now been joined by member Matthew McCabe who replaced Declan Noone and as our external advisor we have appointed Dr Radoslaw Kaczmarek from the USA. Doctor Kaczmarek is a person with haemophilia with whom we have worked for many years and he is an expert on haemophilia care and probably the most noted patient authority on haemophilia gene therapy.

Other highlights of the year included the unveiling of the national HIV monument in December. I was on the commissioning committee for that monument during the course of 2023. I'm very pleased with the final monument which was selected and is now placed in a prominent position in the Phoenix Park.

Our weekly physiotherapy and pilates classes continued and these proved to be very beneficial to members. We have now completed more than 70 tasks which were set out in our strategic plan for 2020 to 2024 and we hope to complete many of the outstanding tasks in 2024.

In terms of finance, we had a good year with effectively a balanced budget once depreciation was accounted for. Due to the requirements for depreciation at a minimum level each year, the actual value of our office building and the apartments that the Society operates for our members, are significantly higher than stated in the audited accounts. We are delighted to have these resources available for our members. It was a successful year and I want to express my appreciation to the board for their dedication and to our small staff team for their hard work during the year, especially given the situation that we continue to be understaffed.

Financial Report for 2023

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Irish Haemophilia Society

Report on the audit of the financial statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Irish Haemophilia Society ('the company') for the financial year ended 31 December 2023 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Reconciliation of Members' Funds, the Cash Flow Statement and the related notes to the financial statements, including the summary of significant accounting policies set out in note 2. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is Irish Law and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", issued in the United Kingdom by the Financial Reporting Council, applying Section 1A of that Standard.

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the company as at 31 December 2023 and of its deficit for the financial year then ended;

have been properly prepared in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", applying Section 1A of that Standard; and

have been properly prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2014.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (Ireland) (ISAs (Ireland)) and applicable law. 
